Dear Saints,

It was during that time the Lord spoke to me about His bride, knowing Him, and His desire that His family would walk in harmony. Since that time, I have seen the Lord work this truth into my life and the life of this body.

Now, as we sense the whole idea of waiting on God being rekindled, we are expecting a deeper understanding of Him and His ways. Unlike the last time when I learned to wait on God alone, there is a body now that is in the place to actively wait on God together.

As we are moving carefully into this time of waiting on God, I believe that we will be knit together in God and His direction for this body. I think that when God chooses to release us into a new phase of growth it will be clear to all in the Spirit. There will be a declaration and a hearty amen.

As we are waiting on God, I would like to give a few cautions: 1. Do not create false expectations. Just wait and see what the Lord will do.

- 2. Do not fabricate "moves" of God. He doesn't need us to make up anything to keep people interested. If people do not want to wait on God, let them go to the circus. We will not turn the church into a circus.
- 3. As we wait, it must be active. We must be zealously throwing ourselves into God.
- 4. Waiting is not being slothful. Waiting time is a preparation time.
- 5. Don't give God time limits. He generally goes just a little longer than the flesh can stand.
- 6. Remember that God abides in and with us. We are only waiting for more of Him.

Men need to learn to relate to men

I asked Steve Humble if he had noticed that men have trouble relating to other men and tend to gravitate toward women. He said yes and wrote this short article to be passed on to you in the Pastor's Brief. Thanks Steve.

"As iron sharpens iron, so one man sharpens another."

Pro 27:17

Iron sharpening iron is not a delicate image, is it? And yet that is the Scriptural picture of one benefit of relationship among men. This image of Godly manhood suggests that men are God's weapons of war and tools for building who need one another to keep their edge ready and effective.

Though many times Scripture uses the words "man" or "brother" in a generic, sexually inclusive sense, this Proverb is especially applicable to men. Men need men and need to learn to relate to men in brotherly and manly ways.

In modern American culture there is a strange phenonomen going on. Many men find it easier to relate with women then with other men. That does not seem strange to most of us, does it? However, throughout history the opposite was true. Look back within our own culture's history to the many church groups where

women sat on one side of the building during services and men on the other. Or at Jewish culture where in the more conservative groups women and men are separated by a screen. While I am not recommending this type of segregation, I do raise the question of whether our forbearers were simply old-fashioned or whether they had a wisdom about human nature that we have lost.

Stephen B. Clark, in his study Man and Woman in Christ, says "Man-woman companionship tends to increase with the development of technological society. This trend seems to be more apparent in socially unstructured Western society than in a more disciplined Communist society, but the observation is true in both cases. In particular, the trend is for men and women to pair off and spend a great deal of their leisure time with one individual of the opposite sex....One effect of this pattern seems to be the sexualization of personal relations....Rather than producing a special depth in relationship (other than, perhaps, a certain kind of affective depth). this sort of relationship produces a personal gratification focus in the lives and personal relationships of those for whom it is a primary form of relating. Those in such relationships tend to evaluate them primarily in terms of what they are getting out of them; consequently, the pairs they form will break up as the sexual-emotional affectivity departs. Rather than centering relationships around similarity of social role and task (as are relationships among men or among women) or around partnership in social task (as in the husband-wife relationship in scripture), the modern ideal of man-woman companionship centers relationships around mutuality of personal attraction. The effect is in good part not socially constructive. As discussed above (in the book), it

has the tendency to feminize males, to produce emotional dependency in females, and to weaken both sexes." pp.647-649

Marriage is a whole relationship involving oneness in spirit, in soul, and in body. "Intercourse" is more than a physical act. There is an intimacy that is never appropriate between the sexes outside of marriage and this intimacy involves more than the physical act of sexual intercourse. while we may not need to return to the segregation of our forbearers, we do need to rebuild some social and personal safeguards in our relationships as brothers and sisters.

As a pastor, I have come to identify several reason that many

There is an intimacey that is never appropriate between the sexes outside of marriage and this intimacy involves more than the physical act of sexual intercourse.

bothers relate more easily with ladies than with men. One common reason is that some brothers never had a close relationship with their fathers or with older brothers. Rather than entering fully into the fellowship of shared roles and tasks with men, they stayed in more intimate communications with their mothers and sisters. This pattern then follows them into adulthood.

Another reason for men hanging around with women is to get emotional comfort. Iron sharpens

(Continued from previous page) iron. Men tend to be direct and even tough with one another. It is nicer to have sympathy than confrontation, but not as profitable.

A closely related reason is that some men tend to seek to meet their self esteem meeds with acceptance from the ladies. This is an expression of insecurity.

A fourth reason, is for sexual pleasure. Rarely have I seen complete purity in close malefemale relationships (outside of ...some men tend to seek to meet their self esteem needs with acceptance from the ladies. This is an expression of insecurity.

marriage). Almost always one or the other has a sexual attraction and quite often is self-deceived into thinking that the relationship is platonic. Even if it is, our standard for relationships is Godliness, not platonism.

Bothers, we need to find our acceptance and self-esteem in the Lord. We need to love and accept one another as brothers in the Lord and give manly affirmation to one another along with exhortation and correction. We need to relate carefully to our sisters. (Study I It 5:1-2 and It 2:1-6) At the appropriate time and in the appropriate way, let each brother find his own wife and win her with pure motives and in all righteousness.

Paul's instruction

Treat younger women like sisters, in all purity

"[Treat] older women like mothers [and] younger women like sisters, in all purity." I Timothy 5:2

Paul obviously knew that establishing the Kingdom helped structure the way people related to each other. In this chapter of I Timothy, he is plainly stating the way a young man should relate to other members of the Christian community. Specifically, in verse two, Paul says that men should treat "younger women like sisters, in all purity." That is the topic of this article.

Since a lot of the relationships in Lexington Christian Fellowship involve young men relating to women, we have been quite outspoken in how we believe those kind of relationships should be structured. As a result, many have had fruitful experiences in relating (Unfortunately the result of our teaching does cause some to get upset, claiming that older Christians are only wanting to control their lives).

Our goal in teaching on the relationship between young men and women, is that they would have meaningful, pure, brother-

sister relationships. However, in order to bring people to this place, certain obstacles must be over-

Among the men, a considerable obstacle is the sexualization of their attitudes toward women. For many men, our society has thoroughly brainwashed them into sexual thought patterns toward most of the women they meet. Unfortunately, when those men become Christians their mind is not automatically renewed.

Our basic game plan in helping a young man come to the place that he can carry on pure relationships with the younger women is to ask him not to try to date any particular sister. Instead, we ask him to develop relationships with the brothers and allow them to know him and work with him in developing a pure mind.

Many say that it would be better to try to develop some close relationships with women and deal with any lustful thoughts as you go. Our experience has proven that this is similar to sending an alcoholic to the liquor store to buy matches. Don't expect to see your money or the matches.

As a man comes to the place that he can honestly say that he has pure motives in relating to the younger women, we encourage him to develop proper friendships with some of the women. We try to give boundaries to keep a young man from tripping back over into the wrong mindset.

Our general advice is to keep away from situations that would be misinterpreted as romantic. Also, we encourage them to keep the relationship public. That is, we ask that he not major on spending time alone with one particular sister. Developing relationships in group settings is advised.

For men who want to give themselves to building the Kingdom instead of a romance, this has been good advice. Some have found real healing and renewing in their minds. As a result, they are not continually plagued with fighting improper thoughts or desires toward women.

On the negative side, some do not see the need of a time of "drying out" their emotions by not getting into deep relationships

Waiting on and becoming one with God

"And Samuel said to Saul, Thou hast done foolishly: thou hast not kept the commandment of the Lord thy God, which he commanded thee: for now would the Lord have established thy kingdom upon Israel for ever. But now thy kingdom shall not continue: the Lord hath sought him a man after his own heart, and the Lord hath commanded him to be captain over his people, because thou hast not kept that which the Lord commanded thee."

I Samuel 13:13-14

Saul and David

Earlier, Samuel had told Saul to wait for him and that he would return. However, Saul became anxious and offered up a burnt offering before Samuel's return. This anxious and unlawful sacrifice by one who was not a priest was the result of fear of the enemy, and fear of the people (See verses 8 and 12). Saul could not wait on God. He moved out in his own power.

Consequently, God found "a man after His own heart". That man was David.

"After"

That word "after" brings to light a quality that God wants in all of his men. According to the Theological Wordbook of the Old Testament, it literally means "to tarry, delay, or defer". When used as a verb, "It refers to situations of staying behind, delaying, waiting..."

God does not need folks who will run out ahead of Him and try to do His thing their way. He wants us to learn His ways by following Him. However, if we are always motivated by fear, it would be easy for us to just try anything to relieve the situation.

David exhibited this heart to wait on God when the Philistines had gathered for the second time in the valley of Rephaim (II Samuel 5). Earlier, David had sought God when they gathered and God said go down and fight.

At this second gathering, David did not presumptuously go down and fight because he had won the first battle. He went back to God. This was fortunate for David, because God had a different plan for victory this time. David was to circle around and wait by the mulberry trees until he heard a wind moving in the tops of them. Then, he would be assured another victory. It worked.

The key here is that David did not move presumptuously the first time, and he didn't take God for granted as the second time rolled around.

I remember being tempted to "make something happen" in the church because I was afraid people would get bored.

A pastor's temptation is to try to make it seem like something is happening besides waiting. People don't like to wait and pastors like to keep people happy. I am sure I fell a few times in this area. Hopefully, I have matured enough not to try to make up anything to prove God is with us.

It is so much nicer to know that God is with us and be satisfied with more of Him. To wait for Him and then only follow His footsteps.

In daily life, we can become bored with ourselves and want some excitement. What we really need at that point is to get out of ourselves and get into God. Then, when we are engulfed in Him, we will be thrust into the eternal purposes of God with God.

"Wait"

The word "wait" is used by David quite often in the Psalms he wrote. Psalm 37:9 says "...those that wait upon the Lord, they shall inherit the earth."

This word is more than just "hanging around". It is an active enmeshing with God. Literally translated, it means to twist together like the strands of a cord. This is the picture of how God wants us to wait for Him. We should become so much one with Him that when He moves we are pulled along with Him.

David also said of those that wait on God-- Let them not be ashamed (Ps. 25:3), that he waited on God all day (25:5), it can preserve you, He shall exhalt them to inherit the land (37:34), that God will be their defence (59:9), that he would wait only on God (62:5), and that He gives them their meat in due season (145:15).

Of course any commentary on the word wait would not be complete without mentioning Isa. 40:31 "But they that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; and they shall walk, and not faint."

Waiting involves praying, being obedient to what you know, and seeking God through His word. When you are without direction, the best thing to do is to hurry up and wait.

The sabbath

A day filled with "meetings"

We don't meet on Sunday mornings. There are both pros and cons to not meeting twice on Sunday. I want to mention one of the positive factors in having only one meeting.

Generally speaking, meeting only once on Sunday gives the day more of a feeling of rest. Trying to pull together two public meetings in one day can make it hectic for all involved.

Some might say that it is a day to be set aside for the Lord and therefore you should have meetings all day. I agree. I just don't think they have to be public meetings. I aim at having three meetings every Sunday.

The first meeting is personal. I try to have a significant time of meeting with God each Sunday. Since I am to preach at the public meeting on that day, I often sit with the Father and consider what He would have me communicate. Since I have studied through the week, this is a good time for me to let the Lord, pull it together for me.

How wonderful it would be if everyone could schedule a meeting such as this on the Lord's day. How wonderful our public meeting would be if all who came had already met with the Father and were prepared to worship Him with the others who had gathered.

My second meeting I aim to have on Sundays is a meeting with my family. I always try to spend some restful time ministering to them by cooking breakfast or something else special. I try to communicate the Father's love to them in some distinctive way. We are working at keeping a special awareness of the Lord during our sabbath together. If anyone is interested in how we are trying to do that, I would be happy to share that with you.

Finally, at the end of our sabbath, I meet together with my church family. It is here that we corporately worship and sit at the feet of our Lord, Jesus Christ. We all come as ministers to one another. It is at this meeting that the Father speaks to us as a whole and gives us a corporate direction. What I learn from Him alone, adds to this meeting. What strength my family has gained through our time together is brought to this meeting.

Yes, I agree that this day should be filled with church meetings. I just keep in mind that I (as you are) am the church.

If you have not been able to arrive in good condition on Sunday nights, try this:

- 1. Begin your sabbath on Saturday night with family and/or friends. Eat a meal together and set the next 24 hours aside as a sabbath.
- 2. During the morning on Sunday, bless family and/or friends by just spending time together and talking about the Lord.
- 3. After lunch, set aside some time to prepare for the evening meeting and just be with the Lord.
- 4. Arrive early for the Sunday night meeting. You will have time to mesh in with what the Spirit is preparing for the evening.
- 5. After the meeting, spend time considering what the Lord has said to you during the day. You may want to do this with others at a restaurant, or in your home. Then, before you go to bed, you may want to just talk to Him about it.

If you try this for four weeks and you are not completely satisfied...try it four more weeks.

Let's pray Together!!!

Every church body needs a time that they come together for prayer. We began a few months ago praying every Thursday morning. As time went on, there were those who wanted to pray every morning. That was good for a season.

Now, it seems good to let people spend most of those early morning prayer times in personal prayer. So, we have returned to praying only one morning a week.

Prayer begins every Thursday morning at 6:00 a.m. at Jimmy's house. It lasts for one hour and is directed at intercession for ourselves as a church and the body of Christ in Lexington as a whole.

It would be worth your effort to be a part of our prayer time.

Reaching the nations

Missions are developing as our vision grows

Most people do not realize that we were begun as a mission church. We were sent to a people who had no church. A new work had to be started. Those people could not support a pastor.

We had to be resourceful and persistent. We had to overcome cultural differences. We needed the grace of God in special measure.

And, by that grace which He surely did send, we are now a church. We are reaching the untouched peoples from the heathen culture of the University of Kentucky.

We are now looking to establish ourselves more in the community as we continue to keep our primary "missions" outreach to the University of Kentucky.

However, as we continue to grow, we believe God will use us to reach other mission fields. One area that we believe God will use us in is the surrounding Universities. There are at least 100,000 college students within three hours of Lexington. As we become able financially, we hope to send missionaries to these other fields in need of God.

Also, God is laying the foundation for us to be involved in reaching out to Mexico, South Africa, recently England, and possibly China (We have contacts through Li Bei and his wife).

Our goal in sending missionaries is to birth them out of our own body and support them completely until they can be established indigenously. We are not really trying to support a lot of missionaries with a little. Instead, we want to support a few missionaries with a lot.

Also, we want to support men and women who have been birthed and sent from this body, or men that we have deep relationship with and can trust. This is in keeping with the basic Biblical pattern we have discovered in regards to basing ministry on relationship.

Right now, our growing mission concern is Pedro Basilio, in Southern Mexico. We are hoping to grow in our responsibility to him and his family (See article this page).

Building in Mexico with Pedro Basilio

On December 26,1989, we hope to leave for Ayutla to spend some time with Pedro Basilio. While we are there, we hope to "build a church" building for Pedro while helping him "build the church proper".

In order to do that, we will need to raise about \$10,000.00. We are asking everyone to pray about how much money they would want to commit monthly until December. We will also be talking to some other churches about helping to finance the building.

You will get a card from your home fellowship pastor to fill out with 1. your name, 2. if and how much you plan to give, and 3. if you are planning on going on the trip.
